We were shocked and saddened to hear of the sudden death of Councillor Ruth Ling. Ruth was a much-respected member of our local community and for many years a councillor for Clapham Common ward. A full tribute will appear in a future newsletter.

The Old Fire Station

The fourth of the Clapham Society's green plaques, commemorating the former uses of historic buildings, has been unveiled on The Lodge, 33 The Pavement (opposite The Frog pub). This was built in 1868 as Clapham Fire Station, and remained in that use until 1902. We are very grateful to Matthew and Gillian Bennett for their permission to erect the plaque.

It was unveiled on 5 June by Professor Andrew Saint, General Editor of the *Survey of London*. He spoke about the formation in 1866 of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade as the first publicly funded fire service for London. Twenty-six new fire stations were built, but as fire appliances became larger and more were required, most of these stations have been demolished or drastically altered to make way for larger ones. Because of its constricted site, the Clapham station had to be replaced on a new site in Old Town, leaving the old building as a unique survivor. It is also a rare example of the work of the architect Edward Cresy junior.

The unveiling went with a hitch. When the cord was pulled, the cloth covering the plaque tore, leaving it half stuck to the plaque. So a resourceful member fetched a bar stool from The Frog, and the tallest person there, who lives in The Lodge, stood precariously on it to complete the unveiling. After that, the company adjourned to The Frog, where Andrew Saint recalled the story of how, when George VI opened the New Bodleian Library in Oxford, the ceremonial key broke in the lock.

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Trees for Cities

At our May meeting our speaker Richard Lambert, Youth, Community and Education Manager at Trees for Cities, took his very attentive audience through many aspects of the work of the organisation, now celebrating its 20th birthday. An independent charity, its main brief is to plant trees in urban areas, but it goes far wider than that with a conviction that trees can change lives for the better. Critical to all their projects is community involvement and a level of local commitment that will ensure future viability.

Richard gave a few statistics to illustrate the scale of their work. They currently deliver around 20 projects in London each year; are present in 16 regional UK cities and eight international cities. They have planted over 160,000 trees in London involving over 65,000 people. Working with the Friends of Clapham Common and Lambeth Council they have planted 38 species of trees on the Common over the past five years.

A lot of their work is educational and involves schools and colleges, including seven schools around Clapham Common. They are able to offer specialist City & Guilds qualifications in work-based horticulture – certificate level 1 and diploma level 2.

A highlight of the evening was a video about an Edible Playground created at Rotherfield Primary School in Islington. The children's happiness at being able to show the food which they had grown and harvested was good to see. (It is on the Trees for Cities website <u>treesforcities.org</u> and well worth a look.)

In contrast, we were shown a joint project in La Paz, Bolivia, which involved the reforestation of hillsides where the land had become unstable resulting in landslides.

Literary Putney

This is a fascinating survey of literary figures from Samuel Pepys to Jilly Cooper, with connections, sometimes tenuous, to Putney. For some of them it was a safe haven from the bustle and smoke of Central London or a backwater for gay writers like EM Forster, who didn't come out, or JR Ackerley, who did. Mary Wollstonecraft tried to commit suicide by jumping from Putney Bridge and Algernon Swinburne was sent there in 1879 to dry out and remained until his death 30 years later. Laurie Lee found work as a labourer and started writing and William Cooper set his Scenes from Married Life here. Some of them are commemorated by Putney Society blue plaques and there is a map, showing where many of them lived, which would make an interesting literary walk.

Haunted Lambeth

Even if you don't believe in ghosts, these stories of the many varied manifestations bring local history to life in an unusual way. They provide a focus for weekend family trips out and about to different destinations with the added spice of the supernatural for those who like a shiver down their spine. For example, the Victorian gothic delights of Platform One on Tulse Hill Station on a deserted Sunday afternoon provide an ideal setting for listening for the ghostly footsteps of a platelayer who didn't hear the new electric train. It is a good story to bear in mind when electric cars become commonplace. The Tradescant tomb is tailor-made for an MR James ghost story and worth a visit to the Garden Museum even though any attempt to raise this particular spirit would now involve breaking into the Museum at midnight. This book provides an unusual approach to exploring Lambeth, it is great fun and is recommended entertainment for residents, visitors and would-be ghost hunters alike.

Roads and Transport Sub-committee

Further to the note in last month's newsletter on 30 May a small band of members attended the first meeting of the re-convened Roads and Transport Sub-committee.

- As a first step we have agreed a broad overall remit covering the following: quality and maintenance of Clapham's streetscape/public realm;
- quality and maintenance of Clapham's streetscape/
- health and safety;
- improvements to the local network;
- management of works to the highway;
- public transport issues; and parking policy and controls. We then considered a range of issues that are likely to provide the focus of our energies for the time being. Some of the main ones are:
- i the future of Clapham Fire Station, which is currently threatened with closure as part of a package of cuts being imposed on the London Fire Service.
- ii implementation of the Clapham Gateway project and consequential proposals in regard to cycle routes and parking around Old Town that have largely emerged since the approved scheme was drafted.
- iii maintenance of footpaths and streets, and the presence of obstructions that are unsightly and present a hazard.
- iv improvements in public transport, including seeking re-instatement of a direct rail service to Victoria from Clapham High Street and Wandsworth Road stations.
- v rationalising parking controls to better cater for local needs.
- vi maintenance of trees in residential streets.
- vii pressing for greater control over changes of use and licensing of premises a concern shared with the Planning Sub-committee.

We are currently undertaking a small survey of short term parking in Old Town, and have submitted comments to the London Fire Commissioner opposing closure of our local Fire Station.

The Sub-committee aims to meet every two months, and seeks ideas and feedback from members as well as potential volunteers prepared to serve on the sub-committee and to help with surveys, etc. Please contact Mark Leffler (contact details on back page).

Saturday 10 August Lambeth Wind Orchestra Lighthearted, family-friendly, repertoire including folk songs, marches, show tunes, pop classics and music from the movies.

Sunday 11 August Southwark Concert Band A varied programme of rousing marches, Broadway and West End show tunes, children's themes and modern interpretations of classics.

Saturday 17 August No Frills Band Brixton based five-piece offering a lively mix of traditional dance music and songs from the Celtic traditions, and across Europe to the Americas.

Sunday 18 August London Consorts of Winds A combination of ancient music and contemporary instrumentation playing popular and light classical pieces.

Saturday 31 August Crystal Palace Band A traditional brass band appealing to a wide audience performing light classical and popular music for all to enjoy.

Sunday 1 September. The Clapham Society's 50th Anniversary celebration concert. An afternoon of traditional jazz by Lambeth favourites, Junction Jazz.

Broadhinton Road Street Party

On 8 June we held a street party to celebrate our 150th birthday. Broadhinton Road in Clapham Old Town – 'A street of Remarkable Unity and Quiet Charm' – was (mostly) built in 1863, its name apparently coming from the Wiltshire village of Broad Hinton where the owner and developer of the land, a Mr. Frederick Hewitt, met his wife Elizabeth in the 1820s.

Earlier this year some of the residents decided that we should have a street party to celebrate our 150th birthday. As we had not had one for either the Royal Wedding or the Diamond Jubilee, there was much enthusiasm for this project, and it all came together beautifully. Preparations had been going on for many weeks, and on 8 June we woke up to a brilliant sunny day, and by 2 pm we were ready to party.

The street, clear of cars, was decorated with bunting and balloons, trees and large shrubs lent by Anthony de Grey Gardens. There was tea and coffee and dozens of delicious home-made cakes, Pimm's, beer (donated by Lost Society), and squash for the children. We had a bouncy castle, which was a great hit with the smaller children, as was the fire engine from our local Clapham Fire Station (threatened with closure). Dozens of excited small people (and some larger ones too) scrambled around in and on the machine for two hours. The firemen were great fun and very kind and helpful with their small fans. There were races for the children, face-painting, pottery-making, and a tug o' war for the grown-ups... the north side of the road versus the south side! The south side won easily, but we had not done a head count so it could well have been cheating! A raffle with some super prizes donated by many local businesses raised a good sum of money for two local charities: the Hibbert Almshouses, and Clapham Pottery. People came and went all afternoon, enjoying the camaraderie, the food, the freedom and the sunshine.

At around 5 pm, there was a barbecue with tasty burgers and sausages, baked potatoes and salads, all donated by residents, more Pimm's, beer and wine. We had music and dancing too, until finally the party broke up around 8 pm, by which time the wind was cold and it was time to bring to a close a VERY special day. What fun it had been to walk freely around the road, to meet and talk to neighbours who otherwise we would never come across!

It was lovely to be able to invite former residents of the road, for them to see how it has changed, and to meet their old neighbours and friends again. Everyone involved agreed that all the hard work and planning had been worth every moment, and had created a spectacularly happy and successful day. And the sun shone ALL DAY LONG! In fact, we can't wait to do it all again.... one day!
