Wednesday 13 July

Some Clapham Plaques – from Greene to Grieg. A guided walk around Old Town and along the North Side of the Common concentrating on the commemorative plaques to people and buildings. Led by Derrick Johnson leaving at 6.30 pm from Clapham Common Underground Station.

Wednesday 14 September

Monday 26 September

Do No Harm. Neurosurgeon **Henry Marsh**, who was brought up in Clapham and whose family have been associated with the Clapham Society since its founding in 1963 – his father, Norman Marsh played many roles in the Society and was finally President for several years – will talk about his best-selling book, *Do No Harm*. Sub-titled *Stories of Life, Death and Brain Surgery*, this is a moving insight into the highs and lows of a life dedicated to operating on the human brain, telling how it feels to hold someone's life in your hands.

Monday 28 November

Slavery, Commerce and the Hibbert Family. Dr Katie Donington, Research Associate on the Antislavery Usable Past project at the University of Nottingham, will explore the Hibbert family and their links to slavery and Clapham. George Hibbert MP was a leading parliamentary proslavery advocate, a Chairman of the Society of West India Merchants, Agent for Jamaica and an extensive plantation and slave-owner. He lived in a large house with a renowned garden on Clapham Common North Side. This talk will argue that the profits from slavery were domesticated and remade as the signifiers of civilisation, taste and status.

St Paul's Opera

On **Friday 1 July** and **Saturday 2 July** St Paul's Opera presents a fully-staged version of Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte (The Magic Flute)*.

Founded in 2013, St Paul's Opera brings an annual picnic-style summer opera festival to the beautiful venue of St Paul's Church in the heart of Clapham Old Town. This year they are performing Mozart's haunting comedy about the quest for love and enlightenment, with a talented cast including local soprano Patricia Ninian as the Queen of the Night. Sung in German with English surtitles and dialogue, and accompanied by a small instrumental ensemble. Picnicking space and bar available in the grounds before the show and during the interval. For resource reasons, Lambeth Council will not in future be putting on a programme of summer concerts on the bandstand. They have however granted some funding to the Clapham Common Management Advisory Committee to enable the CCMAC to put on some concerts. The Clapham Society will also be holding its annual concert.

The programme for August and September will be as follows.

Sunday 7 August. Crystal Palace Band. Traditional brass band music, by one of London's oldest established bands.

Saturday 13 August. 7Suns Band. An energising blend of Afro, Latin, Caribbean, Funk, Jazz and Rock.

Saturday 20 August. Swing at the Bandstand. A dance event by Swing Patrol. Dance demonstrations with opportunities to join in, with professional instructors.

Sunday 4 September. Junction Jazz. Traditional jazz and Dixie by a popular local group (the Clapham Society concert)

Sunday 18 September. London Allstars. Steel drum band with an authentic Caribbean flavour.

All concerts are from 3 pm to 5 pm, and are free to the public.

Our Lady of Victories, St Mary's Church

At our May meeting Paul Sharrock of conservation architects Thomas Ford & Partners, the firm responsible for the recent repairs to the spire of St Mary's Catholic Church in Clapham Park Road, gave us a fascinating illustrated account of the problems encountered and their solutions.

He started by explaining the role of a conservation architect, which is first to identify the significance of the building and its context. Paul explained how this entailed 'unpicking' its history and evolution, and he showed some notable historic restorations such as St Alban's Abbey. We then heard about the origins of St Mary's community, founded by Redemptorist monks who came as missionaries from Italy before Catholic emancipation and then the building of this church in the 1840s. We learnt about some of the important people in the history of the church: among them the founder of the order, St Alphonsus, the benefactor

Fr Edward Douglas, who funded the construction, the original architect William Wardell, JF Bentley architect of the later addition and the monastery, and the 'never knowingly underdressed' Cardinal Wiseman.

Moving on to the restoration Paul acknowledged the unusually generous Heritage Lottery Fund grant, which far exceeded the norm for such a project. He explained the difficulty of undertaking such work - whereas the church was originally built from the bottom upwards, restoration has to take place from the top downwards. The spire is built in Kentish ragstone with bands of York stone at regular intervals although the top section had been rebuilt in Portland stone due, it is believed, to the cable of an escaped barrage balloon wrapping round it during WWII.

With the aid of detailed diagrams Paul showed how courses of degraded ragstone had to be removed and replaced with new or salvaged Kentish ragstone, and some York stone bands also needed replacing

with new York stone. Iron cramps inserted in a previous restoration had expanded and caused further damage. These have been replaced with stainless steel. Photographs taken at every stage of the restoration showed graphically the extent of the damage and the painstaking work required to correct it.

Photographs taken from the scaffolding high up the spire showed striking views of Clapham. Some members of the Society were fortunate (brave?) enough to climb the scaffolding last year, and enjoy the views as well as seeing the work in progress. The architects had also introduced local school children to the work while it was taking place.

The attentive audience was obviously impressed by the clear explanation of extensive work involved, and had some pertinent questions. And we are all, of course, grateful that this important local landmark has been preserved for the enjoyment of future generations.

Lambeth Country Show

This annual event is in Brockwell Park on Saturday 16 July and Sunday 17 July this year. Attractions include sheep dog and owl displays, homegrown vegetables and flowers competitions, craft and food stalls, on site farm and music showcasing local talent. Admission is free.

This annual festival of events, walks and talks organised by Lambeth Archives and various local societies, runs for the whole month of September with events almost every day. Amongst the Clapham events are the South Side walk, Henry Marsh's talk (see front page) our Bandstand Concert (page 2) and Clapham village fete on Saturday 3 September.

This event marking the London Fire Brigade's 150-year anniversary, will feature activities and entertainment for the whole family, including a Clapham Society stall with a display of historic pictures of Clapham fire stations, vintage and modern equipment from the local fire brigade, traditional Morris Dancing and a brass band, face painting, the chance to win prizes at the coconut shy, sack and egg and spoon races, some furry faces from Vauxhall City Farm and much, much more. 
The full programme for Lambeth Heritage Festival will be available from mid July in Lambeth Libraries, at Omnibus and at the Bandstand concerts.

Sunday 10 July at 7.30 pm. Big Bad Wolf, is a London based four piece band with a distinctive sound. Their unique technique bridges the gap between improvised music and contemporary pop/rock styles. Tickets £12, £10 concessions, £5 under 25s.

Saturday 23 July at 7.30 pm. *In conversation with Greta Scacchi*. Star of stage and screen Greta Scacchi makes her debut at Omnibus in the seventh *In Conversation With*. These evenings are spent with some of the country's most intriguing and respected actors. Novelist and critic Peter Guttridge will interview Scacchi, delving into her career and looking back at some of the highlights. Arts and Crafts Hammersmith

We are seeking volunteers to join a growing team undertaking a vital role in the cataloguing and digitising of archive materials from Arts and Crafts pioneers, William Morris and Emery Walker.

Arts and Crafts Hammersmith is a partnership between the Emery Walker Trust and the William Morris Society, who have come together to deliver a major £1m project that aims to celebrate and share the legacies and stories of these and other Arts and Crafts pioneers. The project, which is supported by Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) and other charitable contributions, combines significant refurbishment to the partners' historic house museums in West London, the cataloguing and digitising of substantial collections and archives, and a range of participatory and digital access activities.

Under professional supervision volunteers will be working with archive materials from Emery Walker's house at 7 Hammersmith Terrace and the Morris collections from Kelmscott House, whilst in temporary storage as capital works are undertaken. We aim to produce a comprehensive publicly accessible online record in 2017.
