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May is Book Month in Clapham

In our April newsletter we gave full details of Clapham Book Festival on **Saturday 6 May**, organised by Clapham Writers. In addition Omnibus celebrates its literary heritage (remember the building was once a library) with a festival of storytelling, entitled *And That's Another Story*. Highlights include: **Sunday 7 May** at 11 am and 2.30 pm. *The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch*, a much loved children's classic by Ronda and David Armitage, is brought to Omnibus in an all new musical extravaganza, packed with live music, audience participation and all the sights and sounds of the sea.

Tuesday 16 May until **Thursday 18 May** at 7.30 pm. *Lucy, Lucy and Lucy Barfield* by Lucy Grace, the real-life Lucy who inspired the little girl in C. S. Lewis' Narnia books.. On stage is Lucy Grace who is obsessed with the Narnia books. She discovers that Lewis has dedicated his novel *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* to the real Lucy – his goddaughter, Lucy Barfield. Grace decides to track her down and this is a very personal and poignant tale of her quest.

Friday 19 and Saturday 20 May at 7.30 pm. *We Are Brontë* by Publick Transport. Described as a 'mini comedic masterpiece' – Two would-be performers make an over-ambitious attempt to present a physical interpretation of the Brontë myth without having done the proper research.

42 Clapham Manor Street: London Russian Ballet School Planning Appeal

Following a great deal of work by both local residents and the Society resisting this damaging development (our reasons are explained in the article in the February 2016 newsletter), we are very disappointed to announce that the appeal against Lambeth's refusal to grant planning permission for the extension to the Ballet School has been upheld and planning permission granted.

Having been refused planning permission by Lambeth at the end of 2015, the Ballet School appealed to the Secretary of State. The appeal was finally heard at a Public Inquiry this January and both the Society and local residents presented evidence to it. However the Planning Inspector concluded that there was no harm to the listed Dispensary building (because it had already been much altered internally), and while he agreed that there was some damage to the character of the conservation area (notably the loss of the open aspect at the rear of the buildings), he considered that this was outweighed by what he saw as the public benefits arising from the enlarged ballet school. He considered that the impact of the development on the amenity of neighbours was acceptable. On the basis of these conclusions he upheld the appeal and granted planning permission.

He also decided, harshly in our view, that costs should be awarded against Lambeth on the grounds that the Council had behaved unreasonably in the way it had handled the decision to refuse the application and the subsequent appeal.

This means that the Ballet School can now go ahead with construction once they have complied with the necessary planning conditions, one of which is a Construction Method Statement, designed to manage the impact of the construction process on surrounding residents and streets.

Up in Smoke

We had a very full house for our March meeting when Peter Watts talked about the history of Battersea Power Station, as told in his recent book *Up in Smoke: The Failed Dreams of Battersea Power Station*.

He first showed the view of the power station, familiar to so many approaching Victoria Station by train – now obscured by new blocks of flats. Peter then outlined the early plans for the power station, showing us pictures of several designs which did NOT get built, and spelling out the many objections


which included the allegation that the power station would 'kill every green thing within two miles of Battersea, rot all the buildings and bleach all the babies'.

We then heard and saw the details of the power station we did get, built to the designs of Sir Giles Gilbert Scott, architect of Liverpool Cathedral and the K2 red telephone box. Digging began in 1929, the foundation stone was laid in 1931 and by 1937 the completed half of the power station (A Station) was already being hailed as a wonder of world engineering. Construction of B station continued more slowly during the war, so that the fourth chimney only finally went up, to complete the power station, in 1955.

The next few years were Battersea Power Station's golden age, when it supplied power to one-fifth of London and had around 1000 employees. This was not to last long. With aging equipment and the advent of the nuclear age, Battersea's A station was decommissioned in 1975, and final closure came in 1983. One incident in the final years, fondly remembered by many locals, was the Flying Pig, when Algie the inflatable pig attached between the chimneys for the cover photograph of the rock band Pink Floyd's album, broke loose and caused chaos in the skies over London (including the closure of Heathrow airport) before crash landing in Kent.

The 35 years since the closure of the power station have seen many plans for its use, and Peter showed us a variety of fascinating photographs of proposals. Winner of the initial competition to develop the site was John Broome, chairman of Alton Towers theme park, who confidently named the opening date of his new theme park as 21 May 1990. After years of problems and protest he admitted defeat. Over the next 13 years the Hong Kong developer Victor Hwang commissioned one scheme after another from starry architects, but nothing got built. Later plans included a proposal by Roman Abramovitch to relocate Chelsea Football ground to the power station, a roller-coaster wrapped around the building and many more. Finally the site was bought by the Malaysian developer, now responsible for the present work. Many of us have followed the progress over the last four years, with varying reactions.

The story, with all its twists and turns, objections and approvals, ups and downs, is totally fascinating and told clearly and entertainingly in Peter's book. *Up in Smoke: The Failed Dreams of Battersea Power Station* by Peter Watts, price £20 is available from Clapham Books, 26 The Pavement, or on Amazon.

Westminster Attack: death toll includes Leslie Rhodes from Clapham

On Wednesday 22 March, when Khalid Masood drove a hired car at pedestrians on Westminster Bridge, two were killed on the bridge and 50 were injured.

Leslie Rhodes was mortally injured as he crossed the bridge after an appointment at St Thomas's Hospital. He died the following day at King's College Hospital. Seventy-five year old Les Rhodes, a retired window cleaner, lived in Macaulay Road. He moved to Clapham from Battersea with his family in the 1970s, but lived alone since his parents and brother died some years ago.

Rhodes worked for a window cleaning company in Croydon for many years before setting up his own business with a friend he met at The Sun in Old Town. In an *Evening Standard* interview, his friends reported that Les was proud that one of his clients had been Winston Churchill, whose windows he cleaned at Chartwell.

Les was fondly remembered and described by neighbours 'as nice a man as you could meet.' It was his neighbours who went to King's College Hospital to keep a bedside vigil for him until his death.

His next door neighbour Michael Carney, who had known Les for decades, told *The Guardian* 'You couldn't let someone like that die alone... My wife, Christine, and my two daughters [Emma and Rachel] went up there and stayed with him. The doctors got us to take his favourite music, which was Queen...He couldn't have got better care than the hospital. They were all amazing. The doctors kept on past their shift to stay with him.' Les Rhodes died on the 23 March.

Exactly a week after the attack, a ceremony on flower-strewn Westminster Bridge commemorated all of Masood's victims, the injured and those he killed: PC Keith Palmer, Aysha Frade, Kurt Cochran and Leslie Rhodes.

On 6 April another victim was added to the death toll. Andreea Cristea, the Romanian woman who fell into the Thames during the Westminster attack, died of her injuries. *Dana Kubick*
