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Planning News

Details of representations made on planning applications since February are set out below.

Clapham Common: use for temporary events.

For years Lambeth have allowed events to take place on the Common which, because of the number of them, should have had planning permission. Lambeth has now applied to use the Common for temporary events for 110 days each year. Many of the events are small and have no significant impact. But the application does not set out the full implications of the biggest events and for this reason we objected. No allowance is made for the many days needed either side of an event to put up and take down the large structures used and when parts of the Common become inaccessible to users. No consideration is given to their design, nor are all the large events scheduled to take place included in the application. Rather than 110 days, we estimate that that there will be closer to 200 each year when parts of the Common will be turned over to different uses.

Instead we suggested that the large events should be subject to individual applications, so that the planning implications of each can be properly considered and residents given the opportunity to comment. This application is scheduled to be heard at committee on 4 July.

Eurohotels, 79-81 Clapham Common South Side. Objection to an application to extend the hotel at the rear, with a new building next to No. 2 Cautley Avenue. The hotel site is already overintensively used, causing a nuisance to residential neighbours. In addition the proposed building is a poor pastiche of the neighbouring houses, damaging the character of the conservation area and Cautley Avenue. The application was refused.

George West House, 2-3 Clapham Common North Side. Objection to an application to change the use of this prominent commercial building from office to residential. It will involve the loss of 300 jobs, damage the local economy and erode the vitality and character that a rich mix of uses gives to Clapham. The application was refused. Telephone kiosk outside 22 The Pavement. Objection to an application for a telephone kiosk which is effectively a structure for pavement advertising. The kiosk would obstruct the pavement as well as damaging views from the Common of the period buildings behind it and the character of the conservation area. The application was refused.

44 Clapham Common South Side.

Comments on an application to redevelop the now unused OCS site with 296 new homes, 5000 sq m of employment space and a waste transfer facility. The site is sandwiched between the Notre Dame Estate, Lambeth College and Abbeville Road houses at the back. It is a modern, high-density development consisting of six buildings ranging from ten to four storeys in height, separated by landscaped courtyards, one of which will become a new public square.

There has been a wide ranging design and consultation process over the last year and we have encouraged the height of the development to be reduced to minimise its impact, especially on the Common, its relationship to the adjacent Abbeville Road houses to be improved, links created through to the neighbouring estate and historic drainage problems in the vicinity to be addressed. A decision is expected in July.

Over-large house extensions. The 'improve not move' trend is generating a number of applications for very large extensions to houses, to the extent that their original form becomes unrecognisable and large areas of their gardens are taken over by building. We commented on or objected to several of these (121 Clapham Manor Street, 15 Lydon Road, 43 Rodenhurst Road). Lambeth's policy on this type of development is strict and all were refused or withdrawn.

169 Clapham High Street. Objection to an advertising hoarding on the entrance to the deep level shelter below the Northern Line at the junction of the High Street and Clapham Park Road. Having removed the previous hoardings, repaired and redecorated the historic entrance structure, another advertisement would be a step backwards, damaging the character and appearance of the structure and the conservation area. The application was refused.

Ghostsigns

Sam Roberts with his encyclopaedic knowledge of Ghostsigns kept a large audience informed and entertained at our May meeting.

He started with a run down of what the term means. Basically it refers to the old advertisements painted directly on to the brickwork of buildings, from about the 1890s onwards which have faded over time. But it is also used to cover other old signage, sometimes in mosaic, painted glass shop signs, enamel advertisements and even some moulded in plaster on walls. Sam showed us surviving examples of all these. Some painted ghostsigns are so faded that they are very difficult to read, whereas others which have been recently revealed after being hidden behind hoardings for years are bright and almost pristine.

It just so happens that Clapham is particularly rich in surviving ghostsigns. Sam showed pictures that many of us are familiar with, including the Deane & Co sign on the wall of 17 The Pavement, the Royal London Mutual Insurance Society high on the flank wall of The Alexandra, and the profusion of signs, one on top of another, on Cedars Mews near the corner of Cedars Road and Wandsworth Road. But how many of us have noticed the very faded car repairer in Landor Road, or Gillette in Clapham High Street? Usually, though not always, one needs to be looking up high on the walls of buildings to spot ghostsigns.

Unfortunately, signs are not protected by any legislation and so they do tend to

disappear. One example of this was on Clapham High Street, where a splendid sign reading 'Music Rolls Exchanged' was painted over in 2007. There was an outcry about this locally, which resulted in a question being asked in the Greater London Assembly, but it was stated that nothing could be done about it. Luckily, shortly before it disappeared we photographed it, and the picture is in our book *Discovering Clapham*.

Greater awareness of these historic signs has led to many being saved, but also in some cases to over-enthusiastic and bad restoration. Repainting a sign with modern paint destroys its whole point. On the other hand the lead paints originally used are not now allowed, so the signs are best left to grow old gracefully. An enthusiastic audience detained Sam for a long time, answering questions and discussing the topic.

Sam leads tours of ghostsigns on the South Bank and on his home ground, Stoke Newington. He is thinking of adding one of the Clapham area since we have so many signs. Watch this space! But in the meantime look out for the signs, and I promise you once you start noticing them you will see them everywhere and will be amazed how many there are.

Developments on Clapham Common

Winterville. As reported in April (Issue 396) the CCMAC and representatives of the Clapham Society and the Friends of Clapham Common have continued to give serious and in-depth consideration to the proposals made by Winterville's organisers. The initial proposals were rather skimpy but by dint of detailed probing by the Society, the organisers have provided detailed information about the equipment to be used, on the impact on the Common of the event and their recommendations for protecting the ground. The Society cannot guarantee that, even if fully implemented, such measures would protect the Common. We are equally concerned about the duration of the event, which would commence on 23 November, after 10 days of setting up and end on 1 January. No timing for dismantling the site is available at the time of writing. The Society's representations to Lambeth Events are available on our website claphamsociety. com. We now await Winterville's planning and licensing applications.

Polygon Café. Work has started on the Polygon Café on the WC site opposite the Polygon. It is expected that the works will be completed within 68 days or towards the end of July. LBL's Project manager assured the CCMAC that it would be involved throughout the consultation process in respect of the formulation of plans for the **Westside Changing Rooms**

Quietway 5 and Windmill Drive. LBL's update to the CCMAC on Quietway 5 was delayed by the General Election. It seems that further discussion with the CCMAC will be confined to the surfacing and other design features of the pathway despite the fact that many of the Society's members and other users of the Common have objected strongly to the inadequacy of LBL's and TfL's consultation on this project. Objectors' views were expressed strongly at an open meeting held in March 2017 but have been ignored as far as I can ascertain. There is a very strong rumour that **Windmill Drive** will be closed as part of the Quietway project.

LBL's reorganisation of the Lambeth Parks teams; Fundraising. As previously reported Lambeth Parks has been renamed Lambeth Landscapes. It is now proposed to bring Lambeth Events, Sports and Parks/Landscapes into one department. This should improve communication and coordination and is a welcome improvement. A new head is being sought and senior management reorganisation could follow. In addition, LBL have reinstated two fundraising manager posts in the Lambeth Landscapes team, with the purpose of accessing grants and other sources of income to fund capital investment projects. This is welcome news as there is a dire shortage of finance for capital projects in all Lambeth's Commons and green spaces.

Paddling Pool. The water was turned on at the end of May for the Bank Holiday and drinking fountains for humans and dogs will be turned on within a few weeks.

Volunteers. We are still looking for volunteers who are interested in Clapham Common to join Andrew Sumner and Jonathan McIver to keep an eye on developments on the Common and continue the work done in the past by the Common and Open Spaces Sub-committee which was so enthusiastically and efficiently managed by Anna Jefferson Smith for many years and subsequently Deryn Watson and Annie Bayley.
